THREE BASIC APPLICATIONS

1. Historical: Jonah refuses to obey God’s command to preach to the _____ Capital City of Nineveh. He is reprovved and then he repents. He ultimately preaches impending judgment to the Gentile inhabitants of the Assyrian city. The Gentiles repent, Jonah is angry.

2. Doctrinal: Jonah is a type of the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus Christ; He is a type of the nation of Israel as she is swallowed up by the world but spared supernaturally by God; He is a type of Israel swallowed up by the world, supernaturally delivered by God and sent to the world (*The 144,000 Jewish witnesses preaching judgment and repentance to the Gentile world during the tribulation*).
